AUGUST 19, 2014: RODERICK KIRACOFE: "Unconventional and Unexpected"

Our August meeting will feature Roderick Kiracofe and many of his beautiful quilts. Roderick is the author of the critically acclaimed *The American Quilt: A History of Cloth & Comfort* and *Cloth & Comfort: Pieces of Women's Lives from Their Quilts and Diaries.*



One of his recent books, *QUILTS*, was the result of his curiosity about quilts made during "his era." *QUILTS* focuses on the historical journey of the quilt as a work of art between 1950 and the end of the 20th century. Roderick has sought out quilts considered "outside" the second quilt revival of the 20th century and the Art Quilt movement, looking for the quilts that "broke the rules," those that caught his eye as well as spoke to him as works of art. He was literally amazed and stunned at the treasures being uncovered in unexpected places.

Roderick found many of these quilts on eBay, private dealers, flea markets, and estate sales. They are from all across the country. Some have documentation of a maker and where they were made; most do not. Some are African American (documented) and many are not. He was drawn to the visual beauty and power that each one possesses and is still intrigued and fascinated by the fact that in many cases, slept under, holding untold stories and voices. His newest book, Unconventional & Unexpected: American Quilts below the Radar, 1950–2000, will be released this Autumn.

September 16, 2014: RAYNA GILLMAN: "What If?"

Rayna Gillman is an internationally known artist and teacher. Her work has appeared nationwide in galleries and museums and is in many private collections. She works spontaneously in mixed



media, often using collage and printmaking techniques to add texture to her work. She brings her intuitive sense of color and design into her work and her classes, infusing her students with a sense of play and encouraging them to use the words "What iff" as they experiment in their own work. rgillman@studio78.net

2014-15 Officer Candidates

 $ec{\mathbb{I}}$ he Nominating Committee is pleased to announce the following slate of officer candidates:

Jane Strem, candidate for President, first visited the Guild as a guest then joined in order to attend the 30th Anniversary dinner. She joined the Secret Pal program and is now its coordinator. She was a participant in our last quilt show, and attended QuiltAway. She has contributed Outreach quilts and often makes blocks for Block of the Month and is currently making blocks for Judy Woodfill. Jane has been sewing since she was twelve years old, has a degree in Home Economics with a clothing and textiles emphasis, and has been a textile-sales rep selling European fabrics to fabric stores and manufacturers. Being in and out of fabric stores every day, the quilting urge finally caught her in the mid-1980s and after a move to the Bay Area in the early 1990s she began quilting in a big way. She tends to make traditional functional quilts and has been commissioned and sold many. Jane has also ventured into hand-embroidered elements, hand quilting, and art quilts but her favorite part of quilting is collecting fabric that happens to be spilling out of her second-bedroom quilt studio.

Janet Medpick, candidate for Vice President, has been a Guild member since 1994 and during her twenty years of membership has held numerous offices including President, Vice President, Program Chair, and Saturday Sewcial Chair. In addition, she has co-directed QuiltAway twice and has tirelessly contributed in multiple ways to the success of many quilt shows and opportunity quilts. We also know Janet as a generous teacher. She says her favorite quilting technique includes making traditional patterns more contemporary by using unusual and bold color play.

Carol Damm, candidate for Secretary, quotes the dictionary as saying: "a Guild is an association of people for mutual aid or the pursuit of a common goal" and she offers the following statement: "In my five years in the San Francisco Quilters Guild, I have learned lots about quilting from the speakers, other members, the quilt show, and library books. I'm now

looking forward to aiding the Guild as Secretary. At present, I'm making quilts using all solid colors, but there are some African batiks in my stash that are tempting me, too. Onward to more exploration and discovery . . . "

Gloria Miller, candidate for Treasurer, is currently serving as Guild Treasurer. She is a charter member and has been President (twice), Program Chair, and Parliamentarian. She has chaired numerous committees and projects including QuiltAway and has actively participated in long-range planning, opportunity quilts, program planning, and quilt shows, and is currently active in two sewing groups. Sewing has been a part of Gloria's life since childhood, but a quilt given to her daughter in 1969 actually sparked her desire to start making quilts. Scrap quilts, using multiple fabric patterns, are her favorite quilt style.

Kenan Shapero, candidate for Parliamentarian, is our current President. Kenan has been a member of the Guild since 1996. Her quilting began as a necessity when she couldn't find a blanket to fit her son's toddler bed, so her friend suggested she make one. Armed with a yardstick, a pair of scissors, and tailor's chalk, as well as an architectural background, she drafted that first quilt onto graph paper. Soon after, she was introduced to a cutting mat and rotary cutter and her love of scrappy quilts took off. Kenan loves all types of fabrics (especially silks); her 13+ years of managing SCRAP allowed her to build a large stash that she thinks she'll never get through. Kenan has also served as co-chair of the Membership Committee and is currently co-chairing QUILT San Francisco 2015.

This slate will be voted on, by ballot, at the September meeting. Additional nominations may be made from the floor with written consent of the nominee and presented by the Recording Secretary. Nominating Committee: Joyce Goode, chair; Gloria Miller; Lee Schulstad.

Mon. Sept. 8 7:30 P.M. Single-Strand Floss Plied Patterns. St. John's UCC, 501 Laguna Honda Blvd., SF Discover the economy of thread in the SF EGA lesson of the usually monochrome Blackwork technique, sometimes



referred to as Spanish work in historical references to Catherine of Aragon. The linear patterns accomplished with double running stitches and a single ply from skeins of stranded six-ply embroidery thread resemble lace from Tudor times. Now are counted from graphs for interesting samplers and wearables. Easy to learn upon 14-count Aida fabric; other evenweave linens work too.

Tues. Sept. 16 10 A.M. Hardanger. Lincoln Park Presbyterian Church, 31st Avenue and Clement, SF.

Do you want to work with another counted-thread technique in pearl cotton threads? "Hardanger" is the focus for a space created by a framework of satin stitches, opening cut and more decorative stitches filled into the space. Bring this newsletter for free admission; call ahead if you don't have a sewing needle, scissors, 8" fabric, and floss.

What can twenty-two quilters do in five hours and still have time for lunch? Quilters who came to the Sew-aThon made thirty-nine pillowcases, bound one lap quilt, backed and quilted (finished envelope style) one preemie and three lap/baby quilts, cut and pieced or just found backs for fifteen quilt tops, sewed a number of backs, backed and basted one quilt. A team worked on the 1930s nine-patch quilt put together by many of you. And that's not all—we laughed, talked, and had fun. Some of us had so much fun that we're thinking of doing it again and hope that you will join us.

Now we have lots of lap-size quilts for machine-quilting practice. They provide the perfect opportunity to try your free-motion quilting or to use one of the many decorative stitches on your machine. They are available at the Community Outreach table at meetings, along with some fabulous quilt kits.

Generous Donation from a Grieving Family

Our Guild has received a fabulous stash of first-quality fabric from the family of Debbie Fox Diamond. Debbie was originally from New York but moved to San Francisco to go to college and never left. She had an outgoing personality, a great sense of humor, and loved to talk with people. An animal lover, she was an active volunteer with the San Francisco SPCA and a volunteer docent at the San Francisco Zoo. She liked to make jewelry and hoped to learn how to quilt, but

never quite got the chance. She passed away unexpectedly in May 2014. She leaves behind her husband Dr. Richard Diamond, and her son Eli, an acting student at New York University. Maren Larsen and a group of dedicated volunteers have been sorting the nearly 3,000 yards of fabric and preparing it for Guild use. Fabric has been selected for community-outreach quilts. In fact, several of the quilts finished at the Sew-a-Thon used Debbie's fabrics. We have made up a number of beautiful kits for quilts of all sizes. Some fabrics will be sold at Guild meetings, and others auctioned in November. All proceeds will benefit the Guild. Some of the fabrics will be stored for later use, but we are all mindful of the dangers of storage. We want to use the fabric within the next couple of years, while it is still fresh and new.

Further News

As we go to press, the coverlets for orphans are in Nicaragua, but have not been delivered. We will have a full report on their delivery in the September newsletter with pictures.

2014-15 Budget



August Board Meeting

This month's meeting will be held August 26th at 7 p.m., at Sheila Salomon's home, 440 Rivera Street. All members are welcome and invited to join; committee chairs please submit email reports if not attending.

Block of the Month: Goose Creek block

Will be drawn at September 2014 meeting • Pick your favorite colors—but a bit scrappy

Cutting Directions:

- 10 "dark" 2-1/2" squares
- 8 "light" 2-1/2" squares
- 2 "light" 4-3/4" squares
- 8 "dark" half-square triangles, cut from four 3-7/8" squares







Cut the triangles from two 3-7/8" squares of "dark" fabric, and the center square is a 4-3/4" "light" square! Press seams towards outer triangles. This should measure 6-1/2". Trim if needed.

Start by sewing TWO nine-patch blocks as shown at left, using all 1/4" seams. Press row seams in alternating directions. These should measure 6-1/2" when done, trim them if needed.

Make rows, then sew the rows together, again using 1/4" seams. Press row seams in alternating directions. Assemble block as shown. Hope you enjoy making this block!


