Directions to the Police Academy: Most sewcials are held at the San Francisco Police Academy, 350 Amber Drive (at Duncan), near Diamond Heights Safeway. Take SF Muni bus #52; or drive your car, parking is free.

Lower Price for Sewcials! The cost of all Sewcial workshops has dropped to \$50 (\$65 for nonmembers). This price cut represents a yearlong experiment adopted by the guild's board of directors and is intended to encourage more sign-ups for Sewcials. Saturday April 23: From Fabric Collage to Quilt: Ursula Kern's Introduction to Modular Design


Starting with a collage of fabric scraps, students explore Ursula's modular-design technique for developing their idea,



expanding their color palette, and using grids to turn their models into sewn quilt blocks. Students begin by gluing fabric snippets from three color groups into 1–2 small collages. Next they extend their choice of colors and fabrics, creating what Ursula calls a "shopping list." Working with a see-through grid (squares, rectangles, etc.), students focus on one area and enlarge it to a sewable block size, adding fabrics from their shopping list. The block can then be sewn using string piecing, a traditional design, or improvisational piecing. Students leave the class with several test blocks, ideas for adding "spice colors," and steps to follow for finishing their quilt. **Note: This Sewcial is**

Laura shares her tested approaches for the techniques you'll need to start



your Dear Jane journey. These include the elements of hand appliqué, using freezer paper and spray starch, making sharp points, perfect circles, and bias stems.

available to guild members only to make postings. Gloria Miller set up the


account and monitors it.

Remembering Esther Henley

Esther L. Henley, longtime guild member, passed away February 19°. She was a retired dietitian who previously worked at the Stanford Hospital, San Francisco. She moved here from back East in 1943-44. Her Thursday

sewing circle started in 1968 with five other women after working on a school fundraiser that included Darlene Hartman and Dorothy Scholten. Esther joined our guild shortly after it was formed in 1981 and volunteered at our quilt shows.

During our 2001 Prisms of Time quilt show, Esther kindly loaned her historic family quilt, "Star of Bethlehem," as one of our special exhibits. "Star of Bethlehem" was made by her grandmother Emma Shafer during 1870-1880, and is on the cover of the book, Ho for California: Pioneer Women and Their Quilts by Jean Ray Laury and the California Heritage Quilt Project. The quilt's story is on pages 71–74. In the interview about that quilt, Esther said "It is the only tangible from a grandmother I never knew. It is family . . . into the past and the future."

A few years ago, Esther moved to Delaware to live closer to her son. On a visit back to San Francisco in 2012, she re-discovered a stack of appliqué flower blocks made in Caroline Lieberman's quilting class. Her sewing circle took the blocks and made them into a quilt. Diane Torres did the machine quilting. A second-place ribbon was awarded for it in our 2015 quilt show. The quilt was returned to Esther to enjoy.
